EUROBAROMETER 44.2 TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS

INTERNATIONAL RESEARCH ASSOCIATES

Between 27 November, 1995 and 19 January, 1996, INRA (EUROPE), a European Network of Market- and Public Opinion Research agencies, carried out wave 44.2 of the STANDARD EUROBAROMETER, on request of the EUROPEAN COMMISSION, for the European Foundation for the Improvement of Living and Working Conditions.

The EUROBAROMETER 44.2 covers the total active population of the respective nationality of the European Union member countries, aged 15 years and over, resident in each of the Member States. Non-European were also included. The basic sample design applied in all Member States is a multi-stage, random (probability) one. In each EU country, a number of sampling points was drawn with probability proportional to population size (for a total coverage of the country) and to population density.

For doing so, the points were drawn systematically from all "administrative regional units", after stratification by individual unit and type of area. They thus represent the whole territory of the Member States according to the EUROSTAT-NUTS II (or equivalent) and according to the distribution of the resident population of the respective EU-nationalities in terms of metropolitan, urban and rural areas. In each of the selected sampling points, a starting address was drawn, at random. Further addresses were selected as every Nth address by standard random route procedures, from the initial address. In each household, the respondent was drawn, at random. All interviews were face-to-face in people's home and in the appropriate national language.

For each country a comparison between the sample and the universe was carried out. The Universe description was derived from EUROSTAT Labour Force Survey-Results 1993 (LSF) or from national statistics. For all EU member-countries a national weighting procedure, using marginal and intercellular weighting, was carried out based on this Universe description. As such in all countries, minimum sex, age, occupation (ISCO) & sector of activity (NACE), region NUTS II were introduced in the iteration procedure. Sources include in addition to LSF, the EUROSTAT in the Regional Statistics Yearbook of 1994, and the Eurobarometer. For international weighting (i.e. EU averages), INRA (EUROPE) applies the official "persons in employment" figures as published by Labour Force Survey-Results 1993. The total population figures for input in this post-weighting procedure are listed above.

The results of the EUROBAROMETER studies are reported in the form of tables, datafiles and analyses. Per question a table of results is given with the full question text (English and French) on top; the results are expressed 1) as a percentage on total base and 2) as a percentage on the number of "valid" responses (i.e. "Don't Know" and "No Answer" excluded). All EUROBAROMETER datafiles are stored at the Zentral Archiv (Universität Köln, Bachemer Strasse, 40, D-5000 Köln 41). They are at the disposal of all institutes members of the European Consortium for Political Research (Essex), of the Inter-University Consortium for Political and Social Research (Michigan) and of all those interested in social science research. The results of the EUROBAROMETER surveys are analysed and made available through the Unit Survey Research (EUROBAROMETER) of DGX/B of the European Commission, Rue de la Loi 200, B-1049 Brussels.

Readers are reminded that survey results are <u>estimations</u>, the accuracy of which, everything being equal, rests upon the sample size and upon the observed percentage. With samples of about 1,000 interviews, the real percentages vary within the following confidence limits:
